ENTMLGY 1101 or Biology 1101, or equivalent

Course Description

Exploration of biological factors that permit ants, bees, wasps, and termites to maintain large and complex societies.

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% in person.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content) in addition to 6 hours of homework (assignment preparation, examination preparation) to receive a grade of C average.

Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

Quizzes

Description: Quizzes test a student's knowledge of 2-3 weeks of course content.

Exams 1 and 2

Description: Exams 1 and 2 tests a student's knowledge of 5 – 6 weeks of course content.

Final Exam

Description: The Final Exam tests a student's knowledge of all course content.

Essay 1

Description: Students are required to summarize: one recent article on social insects found in Science News or Science Daily and the Peer-Reviewed journal article on which the popular press article is based.

Essay 2

Description: Students are required to summarize two peer-reviewed journal articles on non-Hymenopteran/Blattodean arthropod social species.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Essay 2 is meant to assess individual student writing. Students should not work together.
