Course Prerequisites

Biology 1113, 1113H, 1114, or 1114H

Course Description

The course serves both as a single, concise exposure to the subject and as a foundation for advanced work in entomology (systematics, evolution, ecology, management). Lectures cover all fundamental aspects but emphasize basic biological phenomena, including diversity, evolution, classification, structure, function, development, reproduction, behavior, and ecology.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Discuss and explain major events in arthropod and insect evolution and unique aspects
 of their biology that have contributed to their diversity.
- Evaluate phylogenetic arguments for the placement of various invertebrate taxa.
- Compare and contrast human and insect respiratory, endocrine, digestive, circulatory, and reproductive systems.
- Examine the role that insects have played in the fields of genetics and molecular biology.
- Generate hypotheses on the origins of social behavior different insect groups.
- Articulate the positive and negative impacts that insects have on agriculture as well as on human and veterinary medicine.
- Predict the best methods for managing insect pests in different contexts.
- Summarize several primary research articles on an interesting aspect of insect biology in written reports and communicate their findings to the class.

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into weekly modules that are released at the beginning of each week. Students are expected to keep pace with deadlines (Quizzes, Exams, Writing Assignments) but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (quiz/exam/assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of C average.
