Course Description

Laboratories will introduce the major patterns of diversity among insects and will provide experience and develop abilities in the identification of insects and non-insect arthropods. We will explore insect and other arthropod diversity and evolution by collecting, identifying, and curating arthropod specimens. A personally collected and identified insect collection is a major component of the laboratory grade.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Dissect insects and identify important external and internal structures.
- Discuss, analyze, and interpret primary scientific literature.
- Identify all insects to Order, as well as ~ 100 common families of insects using sight identification and taxonomic keys
- Collect insects from diverse taxa using a variety of collecting methods
- Pin, preserve, and correctly identify their own insect specimens

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is taught in person. Students are expected to attend class each week during the scheduled meeting sessions. Exams will be administered during class.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 1 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content) in addition to 6 hours of homework (insect collection preparation, studying for quizzes and exams) to receive a grade of C average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

- Attendance at all laboratories is mandatory and critical for student success. Eight percent (8%) of the final grade is based on attendance.
- Collecting Trips: Students must attend one of the three offered collecting field trips.
- Office hours: Contact instructor to make an appointment.

Descriptions of Major Course Assignments

Quizzes

Description: Lab Quizzes test students on ability to identify external/internal structures of Insect and non-Insect Arthropod Classes, and Insect Orders and Families. Quizzes are closed book and timed

Preliminary Collection

Description: Tests student's ability to collect, mount, identify to the ordinal level, and label insect specimens

Final Collection

Description: tests student's ability to collect, mount, identify to the Family level, and label insect specimens

Academic integrity and collaboration: 10% of the specimens in the Preliminary Collection can be collected by another individual. Trading is encouraged.

Biodiversity Assignment

Description: The assignment introduces students to using insects for measuring biodiversity in an area and involves interpreting a data set provided by the instructor.

Academic integrity and collaboration:

The assignment should be a student's own original work.
